About Us Ryan & Elyse Dillon





Germany: A Country

Size: 137,847 square miles (Similar to Montana)

Population: 82 Million (Much larger than entire U.S. Midwest)

Fact: Approximately 3% have a personal relationship with Jesus Christ!

Fact: Many Germans view Christianity as part of their past and only something that is holding them back!

Germany lies in the heart of Europe and borders nine countries: France, Poland, Austria, Denmark, Czech Republic, Switzerland, Luxembourg, Belgium, and The Netherlands. Replacing the Deutsche Mark in 2002, the Euro became the official currency of Germany.

Even though rich in culture and with thousands of years of history and traditions, Germany is still considered a relatively new country. The Federal Republic of Germany was founded in 1945 after World War II with East Germany being added in 1989 after the fall of the Iron Curtain. Today Germany is an influential player in the European Union and a world leader in exporting quality products.

Germany is a beautiful, powerful, affluent, and educated country. Is this enough? Isn't Germany a Christian country? In name, yes. In relationship and practice, hardly!

When looking at the landscape of Germany, you see beautiful churches, cathedrals, or basilicas in every town. What you don't see is the empty pews behind those doors or the liberal pastors who are sometimes not even true believers themselves.

Sadly, only a tiny percentage of Germans know Christ personally: just under **3 percent** to be exact. Germany may look well from the outside but what matters most is the heart of the people on the inside. Germany is a wealthy country with a fairly stable economy and whose cities and towns look a lot like ours in America. **But is it really the financial wealth of a people group that we as Christians should be MOST concerned about?** In a study done in 2005, teenagers around the world were asked if they believe that the Bible is in fact the true word of God. In Israel 50% said yes, in Poland 49%, and then there was Germany with a staggering 2.3%. For most Germans, God isn't even on the radar screen anymore. In one survey Germans were asked whom they find most trustworthy. At the top of the list were gas station attendants and store workers... at the very bottom were politicians and the church. We believe God wants to change this perception of the church and Christians, and we want to be a part of that change.

Since there are so few people in Germany who have a personal relationship with Jesus, we have decided to answer God's calling and go join Him there. We will be working with a church planting organization called Kontaktmission, helping share the message of the Gospel to the German people. **Kontaktmission is a German-based transnational organization** that currently consists of over 240 missionaries from Europe, the US, and the world, serving in 34 different countries.

Dresden, Germany



Dresden is the capital city of the Free State of Saxony in Germany. It is situated in a valley on the Elbe River, near the Czech border. Dresden is a city with a heartbreaking history, to say the least. Once one of the artistic and architectural gems of Germany, during World War II, the city of Dresden was fire bombed and completely destroyed. Since the German reunification in 1990, Dresden has regained importance as one of the cultural, educational, political and economic centers of Germany. The population of the city of Dresden is 530,000, and the population of Region Dresden is over 1 million. Today Dresden is one of the few German Cities that have more inhabitants than ever since World War II.

When looking at eastern Germany in general, we see a great amount of spiritual poverty. In Germany as a whole, 27% of the population claims to be atheist, but in eastern Germany by itself over 50% claim to be atheist. This is a sure sign that it is time for a spiritual renewal and a revival in Germany!

...branch out and establish a new church somewhere in the city of Dresden. We are convinced that God is working and has been working in the city of Dresden all along. We are not going to "bring" God to the people there; we are going in order to join God on His mission to restore and renew His people. With this in mind, a large portion of our planning for this phase is simply to keep our eyes open: are there areas in the city where we see God clearly at work? Are there people who He is bringing into our lives who may be able to partner with us? One key thing we need is to find other Germans to partner with. We are not looking to plant an American church, but to start new German churches. We will consider our ministry successful if we are involved in the starting of new churches in Germany that then go on to plant new churches of their own. Whether we have the opportunity to be involved in a house church, a coffeehouse ministry, or something that God has yet to show us, we are excited to see what God has in store for Dresden. We are just as excited for you to be able to be a part of that ministry yourselves, by partnering with us and with what God is doing in Germany!
